ON THIS DAY

July 12 is the 193rd day of the year in the Gregorian calendar; 172 days remain until the end of the year.

927 – King Constantine II of Scotland, King Hywel Dda of Deheubarth, Ealdred of Bamburgh and King Owain of the Cumbrians accepted the overlordship of King Æthelstan of England, leading to seven years of peace in the north.

1543 – King Henry VIII of England marries his sixth and last wife, Catherine Parr, at Hampton Court Palace. [5]

1691 – Battle of Aughrim (Julian calendar): The decisive victory of William III of England's forces in Ireland. [8]

1776 – Captain James Cook begins his third voyage.

1801 – British ships inflict heavy damage on Spanish and French ships in the Second Battle of Algeciras.

1963 – Pauline Reade, 16, disappears in Gorton, England, the first victim in the Moors murders.

Births

1730 – Josiah Wedgwood, English potter, founded the Wedgwood Company (died 1795)

OLD OCCUPATIONS

KEDGER Fisherman

KEEKER or WEIGHMAN A colliery official who checked quantity and quality of coal output

KEELER or KEELMAN Bargeman (from keel, a flat bottomed boat)

KEMPSTER Wool comber

KIDDIER Skinner or dealer in young goats

KILNER Limeburner, in charge of a kiln

KISSER A person who made cuishes and high armour

KNACKER A harness maker, buyer of old horses and dead animals. 'Knacker's Yard'

KNAPPERS A person who dressed and shaped flints into required shape and size

KNOCKER-UPPER Person paid to wake up northern mill and factory workers on early shifts

KNOLLER Toller of bells

KENT PLACE NAMES

Farningham The origins of Farningham are not entirely clear. One possibility is that it came from the Old English fearn 'fern', -ingas 'dwellers' and ham 'homestead, village'.. The town first appeared as Ferningeham in the Domesday Book.

Faversham Old English probably included a word fæfer which was used for a 'smith'. It first appears in 811 as Fefresham.

Fawkham Green The Green of Fawkham Green is a later addition, but the first word goes back as far as the tenth century, where it appears as Fealcnaham.

Finglesham is clearly an Old English ham, a village or homestead. It was first recorded in 832 as Thenglesham. By the time of the Domesday Book it appeared as Flengvessam.

Folkestone was first recorded as far back as the late seventh century in the guise of Folcanstan.

Fordwich seems to have started life as a 'trading settlement at the ford'. It first appears as long ago as 675 as Fordeuuicum.

Frindsbury takes its name from an association with a man called something like Freond. Its first recorded spelling of Freondesberiam, back in 764.

Frinsted is literally a 'place of protection'. First seen on record in the Domesday Book as Fredenestede.

Frittenden is an Old English denn or 'woodland pasture', It first appeared in the ninth century as Friththingden.

Society Library

The Society Library is open every Wednesday for members to do their own research, socialise, participate in library based workshops and discussion groups and receive help from the library volunteers. The library address is 80 Summerhouse Drive, Joydens Wood, Bexley Kent DA5 2EE Free parking in nearby side roads.

You can use the library's PCs to access Ancestry - and FindMyPast (which currently does NOT include access to the 1921 census, something we are investigating with the library). We suggest joining Kent Libraries as you can then access these websites from your own device whilst in the library which eases pressure on the demand for library PCs.

The library is open from 10am to 4pm but it greatly helps the volunteers if visitors with research queries call in earlier in the day rather than later. Please also bring as much information as you already have about the ancestor you are researching.
