ON THIS DAY

August 9 is the 221st day of the year in the Gregorian calendar; 144 days remain until the end of the year.

1173 – Construction of the campanile of the Cathedral of Pisa (now known as the Leaning Tower of Pisa) begins; it will take two centuries to complete.

1892 – Thomas Edison receives a patent for a two-way telegraph.

1902 – Edward VII and Alexandra of Denmark are crowned King and Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland

1907 – The first Boy Scout encampment concludes at Brownsea Island in southern England.

1971 – The Troubles: In Northern Ireland, the British authorities launch Operation Demetrius. Mass riots follow, and thousands of people flee or are forced out of their homes.

Births

1757 – Thomas Telford, Scottish architect and engineer, designed the Menai Suspension Bridge (died 1834)

OLD OCCUPATIONS

LACE-DRAWER A child employed in lace work, drawing out threads

LANDWAITER Customs officer who checked landed goods

LEAVELOOKER A municipal inspector of markets in an English town (as in Lancashire) - an examiner of food on sale at market

LEGERDEMAINIST A person who practices or performs sleight of hand. Magician

LEGGER A man employed by the owners of a canal to push boats through narrow canal tunnels.

LEIGHTONWARD A gardener

LINKERBOY or LINKERMAN One who carried a link or torch to guide people through city streets at night for a small fee.

LOBLOLLY BOY or LOBLOLLY MAN In 18th and 19th century warships, a non-professional assistant to the ship's surgeon, or errand boy

LUMPER A laborer employed to load and unload vessels in port; a dock-hand; a longshoreman; a stevedore. LUTHIER A maker and repairer of stringed musical instruments

KENT PLACE NAMES

Gillingham means a homestead of Gylla's family. First recorded in 10th century as Gyllingeham **Godmersham** seems to recall *Godmær's village*. It was first recorded in 822 as Godmeresham.

Goodnestone denotes Godwine's farmstead

Gore's indicating literally a place at the triangular plot of ground

Goudhurst is probably an eponym, indicating Gutha's wooded hill.

Grain The name represents the Old English greon, used for gravelly, sandy ground.

Gravesend has nothing to do with graves. It is a place 'at the end of the grove'

Greenhithe is an Old English hythe or landing-place

Groombridge literally a bridge where young men congregate, and it is first recorded in 1239 as Gromenebregge.

Guston describing an Old English tun 'village, farmstead'.

Society Library

The Society Library is open every Wednesday for members to do their own research, socialise, participate in library based workshops and discussion groups and receive help from the library volunteers. The library address is 80 Summerhouse Drive, Joydens Wood, Bexley Kent DA5 2EE Free parking in nearby side roads.

You can use the library's PCs to access Ancestry - and FindMyPast (which currently does NOT include access to the 1921 census, something we are investigating with the library). We suggest joining Kent Libraries as you can then access these websites from your own device whilst in the library which eases pressure on the demand for library PCs.

The library is open from 10am to 4pm but it greatly helps the volunteers if visitors with research queries call in earlier in the day rather than later. Please also bring as much information as you already have about the ancestor you are researching.
